42. If one (or both) of your opponents is a passed hand, assume that player has fewer than 12 HCP. If that player turns up with 10 HCP early on, play the partner for any missing queen, king, or ace.

43. There is nothing more important than counting your sure tricks before you begin to play.

At notrump count your sure tricks **outside** of the suit you plan to establish. This tells you how many tricks you need in your main suit and then play accordingly.

52 FACTS OF BRIDGE LIFE – continued Good Advice To Give Your Partner By Eddie Kantar

Tips 21-40 are defensive tips; today we cover 34-40.

- **34.** When discarding, keep length parity with the dummy. If dummy has four cards in a suit (A-K-Q-8), and you have four cards (9-4-3-2) one of which (the 9) could **conceivably** take a trick, be careful about discarding from that suit. Be **very** careful! Don't!
- 35. It is important to count declarer's tricks as the play progresses. If you find yourself on lead and can see that declarer has enough tricks in three suits to make the contract, shift to the fourth suit. Some chance is better than no chance.

36. When dummy tables, add declarer's likely point count to dummy's known point count.

The bidding has gone 1NT-3NT. Partner leads and dummy has 10 HCP. Say the opponents are playing a 15-17 notrump range. Assume declarer has the middle count, 16, and proceed from there. The opponents have 26 HCP, give or take 1 point, leaving you and partner with 14. You know how many you have, so it is easy enough to figure out how many partner has. Do it!

- 37. When defending a suit contract, there are two main techniques declarer uses to garner extra tricks: (1) setting up a long suit in dummy, (2) ruffing losers in the short hand (usually the dummy.) If dummy comes down with a long and a short suit and you have the long suit bottled up, lead trumps because the long suit is not usable. If it appears that the long suit is usable, play an attacking defense going for outside tricks quickly. If the dummy comes down balanced, declarer has no place to get rid of losers and will eventually lose them, therefore you and partner should adopt a passive defense. Avoid breaking new suits if possible. Let them have what they have coming. Sit back and wait for your tricks. Your day will come.
- 38. The best time to lead a short suit is with trump control. A-x-(x) or K-x-x are great trump holdings to lead from shortness. However, if ruffing will cost you a trump trick, leads from shortness with trump holdings such as J-10-x-x, Q-J-9-x or K-Q-9-x are counter productive.

39. When signaling encouragement with equal spot cards, signal with the higher or highest equal.

With A-9-8-7, signal encouragement with the 9 (which denies the 10). If you lazily signal with the 8, you are denying the 9! Some partners actually watch stuff like that.

40. When giving partner a ruff, the card you lead is suit preference telling partner which suit to return after the ruff.

The return of a relatively high spot card asks for a return in the higher ranking of the two remaining suits. A return of your lowest card asks for a return in the lower ranking of the two remaining suits. The return of a middle card is designed to drive partner crazy. It actually means you have no preference.

Tips 41-52 are playing tips; today we cover 41-43.

41. Before playing to the first trick, review the bidding and make sure you remember the opening lead.

Sometimes the opening lead is a small spot card and it is important to know exactly how small. If the opening leader later plays another small card in that suit, you really want to know whether it is a higher or lower card than the original lead. You really do!

NEW TO USING ELECTRONIC SCORING DEVICES?



Here's Rick Beye explaining how they work. There is one scoring device on each table. After the auction, North enters the contract into a device that looks like an oversized calculator. When play is completed, North enters the result, and then hands the device to one of the opponents to verify that it is accurate. After the opponent OKs the score, it is sent via radio signal to a computer that is compatible with ACBLscore. When the final score of the session is entered, the complete results are available for printout – just as though the data had been entered by hand.







Zero Tolerance Policy

Be cool! Bridge is fun.

Awards Desk



How High: Game or Slam?

A 2/1 Game Forcing response (*① commits the partnership to at least game, and allows both opener and responder the opportunity to explore Where the partnership belongs in a relaxed manner, without having to worry about showing both distribution and strength at the same time. Once the partnership has agreed on a trump suit, or notrump, the focus can now shift to the remaining question, How High: Game or Slam?

Focus on HOW HIGH

Game is assured, but is there enough combined strength for slam? The basic Guideline is that about 33 points are needed to consider a small slam and about 37 points to think about a grand slam. The factors to bear in mind are:

- Combining high-card points and distributional points
- Fit
- Controls

High-Card Points

Slams in notrump are typically bid in a *quantitative* manner, on combined high-card strength **alone**. After one partner has shown a balanced or semi-balanced hand within a narrow point count range, the other partner can add up the combined strength and decide whether there is enough to bid a slam.

The opening 1♦ bid shows about 12 or more points. Holding 20 high card points, responder knows the partnership has enough combined strength to go for a small slam, but doesn't yet know WHERE. When opener rebids 2NT, showing a balanced hand, responder can simply take the partnership to 6NT. This is a straight quantitative auction. Although the combined strength for notrump contracts is mainly based on high-card points, long suits can be valuable as well. Most players add 1 length point for a five-card suit, 2 points for a six-card suit, and so on.

Opener has 12 high-card points. Responder has only 19 high-card points, but adds a length point for the five-card diamond suit. The partnership reaches 6NT with only 31 combined high card points. However, the five-card suits prove very useful. On normal breaks, declarer has twelve tricks off the top: five spades, two hearts, and five diamonds. If it is unclear whether there is enough combined strength for slam in notrump, either partner can make a quantitative – invitational – raise.

Responder's 4NT is not Blackwood, since no trump suit has been agreed. It's an invitation to slam – in the same way a raise of an opening 1NT to 2NT would be an invitation to game. With a minimum opening, opener rejects the invitation by passing.

Opener has 18 HCPs, a hand too strong to open 1NT. After the game-forcing 2♦ response, opener doesn't need to jump to show the extra strength; the 2NT rebid is forcing. When responder shows a willingness to play in notrump, opener now shows the extra strength with an invitational raise to 4NT.With a

minimum balanced hand, opener would simply pass 3NT. Holding 14 HCPs plus 1 length point responder accepts the invitation bidding 6NT.

Distributional Points

Long suits are typically valuable, whether the partnership plays in a notrump or suit contract. They provide a potential source of tricks. So both opener and responder count length points in addition to high-card points when valuing the hand. Short suits may or may not be of value. In notrump contracts, they can be a liability. In suit contracts, they can be very valuable in a side suit after a trump fit has been found. They can prevent the opponents from taking winners in a suit, and may provide an additional source of tricks for declarer through ruffing. However, shortness won't be of much value if it is in partner's suggested trump suit or opposite a lot of high card strength in partner's hand. So the guideline is to *value points for shortness – dummy points – only after a trump fit has been found.*

Opener has 17 HCPs and can add 3 dummy points for the singleton diamond once the heart fit is uncovered. That's enough to check for aces, even though responder shows nothing extra. The combined hands have only 28 HCPs, but the added points for distribution – responder for length and opener for shortness – make slam a good bet.

Fit

An advantage of 2/1 Game Force is that it provides the partnership a leisurely way to explore for a suitable trump fit. *Finding a fit is crucial, especially when it comes to slam bidding.* Distributional factors can't effectively be brought into play until a fit is found.

Opener has 17 high-card points plus 2 length points for the six-card suit. Responder has 13 high-card points plus 2 length points for the six-card suit. That's a total of 34 combined points, more than enough for slam. But when no suitable trump fit can be found, the partnership has to settle for game. It will be very challenging to find a good source of tricks, and entries back and forth between the hands will be difficult or non-existent.

When the partnership finds a fit, all the distributional factors come into play. Here there are only 26 combined high-card points, but once opener agrees on hearts as the trump suit, responder can imagine that there will likely be twelve tricks if opener has two aces.

Controls

Once the partnership has found a suitable trump fit and knows there is likely enough combined strength to consider a slam, one final consideration is controls. *A control is a holding that prevents the opponents from taking too many tricks in a suit.* An ace is a first-round control, since it stops the opponents from taking the first trick in a suit. In a trump contract, a void can also serve as a first-round control, since it prevents the opponents from taking the first trick in a suit. A king represents a second-round control. The opponents can take the first trick with the ace, but the king will stop them on the second round. In a trump contract, a singleton can serve the same role as a king – a second-round control.

When bidding a small slam, it's important that the partnership holds first-round control in three suits, and at least second-round control in the fourth suit. Otherwise, the opponents can take the first two tricks before declarer even gets started.

To bid a grand slam, the partnership needs first-round control in all four suits. It's discomforting to watch the opponents take the first trick when we have contracted to take all thirteen!



trump fit consists of a combined holding of at least eight trumps in declarer's hand and dummy. But it is well known that lesser holdings sometimes produce an excellent contract. This is especially true of the four-three trump fit, known as a "Moysian" fit — a tribute to the late Alphonse "Sonny" Moyse who wrote extensive articles on the subject.



West led the • K and declarer quickly took advantage of dummy's singleton: • A; spade ruff (with heart ace); heart to nine; spade ruff; diamond to king. The remaining trumps were drawn; but when the diamond finesse failed, declarer went down one. He still fared better than he might have at three notrump (likely down two), but he should have succeeded.

Moysian fits are delicate contracts. With only a slight superiority in trumps declarer must time the play carefully to keep things under control. After winning the ♠ A, declarer should immediately lead a *low diamond* to dummy's jack — if the finesse wins, great; but if it loses, there is no damaging return. East wins the ♠ Q and might as well return a diamond (nothing matters). Declarer wins the ♠ K, ruffs a spade with dummy's ♥ A, draws four rounds of trumps (throwing clubs from dummy), then runs the diamonds for his contract.
